



# INFORMATION

## PARK OPERATING HOURS:

From mid-October to mid-March, Disneyland is normally open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Wednesday through Friday, and from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., Saturday and Sunday. The Park is normally closed Monday and Tuesday except during special holiday periods when Disneyland is open with extended hours. From mid-March to mid-October Disneyland is open daily with extended hours throughout the



Summer and on special holidays. We advise Disneyland guests to phone or write for exact information concerning days open, hours, events and performers scheduled to appear, parade or performance times, ticket prices, etc., when planning a trip to Disneyland. Park hours are subject to change without notice. Contact Disneyland Guest Relations, P.O. Box 3232, Anaheim, California 92803, or phone (714) 999-4565.

General information about Disneyland may be obtained at CITY HALL, on Town Square, and at CAREFREE CORNER at the end of Main Street. As you explore the Happiest Place on Earth, feel free to ask any employee for assistance.

Information about other Southern California recreational attractions and public transportation schedules may be obtained at CAREFREE CORNER.

## American Express

Your American Express card is the official credit card of the Magic Kingdom and is accepted in many shops, stores and restaurants.

## Baby Center Presented by Gerber

Located between CAREFREE CORNER and the First Aid Center at the end of Main Street. Facilities for preparing formulas, warming bottles, breast feeding and changing infants. Sorry, babysitting is not available.

## Banking Services

The Bank of America, located on Town Square, provides complete banking facilities from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. every day Disneyland is open.

Check cashing up to \$20 in cash with proper identification is available after the Bank closes at the Main Street Railroad Station Ticket Booth in Town Square; the New Orleans Square Ticket Booth in front of the Haunted Mansion; the Fantasyland Ticket Booth at the base of the Matterhorn; Tomorrowland Ticket Booth near the Autopia.

Most Disneyland shops, stores and restaurants will accept travelers and personal checks, with proper identification, for the amount of purchase only.

## Camera Center Presented by Polaroid

All forms of photographic supplies and assistance are available at the Camera Center on Main Street. Guests may use Polaroid's new Pronto "Sonar"

automatic focusing camera, or a Polavision movie camera with the purchase of appropriate film and a refundable deposit. Polaroid 8 x 10 portraits, are also available.

## Guided Tours

Recommended for "first time guests," the two-and-a-half hour tour begins on Main Street, U.S.A., to the left of CITY HALL, and includes general admission, five exciting attractions with a guide, and an unlimited ticket for the remainder of the day.

Guided tours may be purchased at Disneyland's Main Gate Ticket Booth or inside the Park at the Main Street Railroad Station Ticket Booth.

## Locker Service Presented by National Car Rental

Facilities for checking purchases and garments are located between the Fire Station and the Emporium on Town Square, Main Street.

Lockers large enough for suitcases are located near the Parking Lot Tram Station, west of Disneyland's Main Gate Ticket Booths.

## Lost and Found Presented by National Car Rental

Facilities for lost and found items are furnished between.

Emporium on Town Square, Main Street.

## Lost Children

Facilities for the care of lost children are maintained within the First Aid Center at the end of Main Street. Messages for lost persons may be left at CITY HALL on Town Square.

## Mail Service and Postage Stamps

Stamp machines and mail boxes for letters and cards are located throughout Disneyland and at the Hallmark Communication Center on Main Street.

## Pet Care

Pets may be left for the entire day at the Pet Kennel to the right of the Main Gate Ticket Booths. Pets are placed in airy, individual enclosures and fed for a nominal fee. Sorry, pets cannot be left overnight.

## Picnic Area

Food and beverages cannot be brought into Disneyland, but guests bringing picnic lunches may use picnic facilities located outside the Main Gate, to the left of the Newsstand. Guests leaving the Park to use this area must have their hands stamped to re-enter the Park.

## Public Telephones

Located throughout Disneyland. Refer to an area map, or ask any employee.

## Rest Rooms

Located throughout Disneyland. Refer to an area map, or ask any employee.

## Security Officers

If you need assistance, Disneyland Security Officers can be recognized by their themed area costume, or contact any employee.


## Strollers and Wheelchairs

Disneyland tickets for adults, juniors (ages 12-17) and children (ages 3-11) may be purchased at the Main Gate Ticket Booths and the Monorail Station at the Disneyland Hotel.

mission, a two-and-a-half hour personalized small group tour of five exciting attractions, plus an unlimited use ticket for the remainder of your day. The Guided Tour is especially recommended for "first-time guests".

## Insiders' Tips on Making Your Visit More Pleasant

These suggestions will help save time, energy and footsteps while you enjoy all there is to see and do during your visit to Disneyland.

### Attractions

No matter what the season, the best time to see Disneyland's most popular "E" attractions is early in the day (before Noon) or just before Park closing. Let the descriptions listed on pages 7-25 help you decide which attractions you wish to see. We suggest you begin with a train trip around the Magic Kingdom, and then pro-



ceed to the attractions of your choice using the inside map as a guide. Your ticket books will enable you to experience a variety of attractions and adventures. And, for your convenience, tickets may be purchased at certain ticket booths throughout the Park. If waiting lines are long, don't forget to see the free attractions and exhibits, and the many live shows presented each day at Disneyland.

### Dining

Disneyland offers a variety of restaurants and refreshment centers, certain to please any taste or appetite! Busy lunch and dinner hours during the summer or holiday periods may be avoided by having an early or late lunch (11:30 AM or 1:30 PM) and dinner (4:30 or 8:00 PM), depending upon Park operating hours.

### Shopping

You'll find everything in Disneyland from souvenirs to

antiques. We suggest you shop in the early morning or mid-afternoon to avoid busy "last minute" shopping conditions when the Park is closing. Rather than carry your purchases throughout the entire day, you may wish to check them in our locker facility located between the Fire Station and the Emporium off Town Square on Main Street, U.S.A.

### Parades

Disneyland parades are featured throughout the year on Main Street, U.S.A. During our busy Summer Season, you may wish to find a viewing spot one-half hour before the parade begins along the route specified in the daily Park program.

### Re-Entry to Disneyland

If you wish to leave Disneyland and return during Park operating hours on the same day, you must have your hand stamped at the exit turnstiles. You may re-enter the parking lot, free of charge, during Park operating hours on the same day if you retain your parking ticket and present it at the Parking Lot Entrance upon your return. Disneyland Hotel guests and visitors, exiting by way of the Disneyland Monorail, must also have their hands stamped as they exit the Monorail to obtain re-entry during Park operating hours on the same day. (Note: Return trip by Monorail will require an "E" ticket).

★ If the handicapped guest is accompanied by only one other person, they may enter the attraction through the exit. If the party is larger than two, the remaining guests are requested to wait in line and join the handicapped guest and escort at the attraction's loading area.

All live entertainment areas, most restaurants and shops can easily accommodate guests in wheelchairs. ### TELEPHONES

Telephones, placed within easy reach of guests in wheelchairs, are located at the exit of Space Mountain, the exit of Mission to Mars, the exit of Tomorrowland Skyway, in the Bell System Exhibit of "America the Beautiful," at Alpine Gardens, next to the Dumbo attraction and at the entrance to Frontierland in the stockade. Telephones are also located outside the Main Gate at the Guest Courtesy Complex and next to the Kennels.

### BLIND GUESTS

Complimentary tape cassettes and portable tape recorders designed for assistance through the Magic Kingdom are available at CITY HALL.

**SPECIAL PARKING** is provided for handicapped guests in the Handicapped Parking Section, near the Main Gate Ticket Booths. Inquire at the Parking Lot Entrance.

# PHOTO TIPS

## TIPS FOR BETTER DISNEYLAND PICTURES

### Before You Shoot

1. Make sure your camera is clean. Clean the lens by first blowing off the dust, then moistening and wiping gently with a soft tissue. Clean the inside of the camera by blowing out any dust; wipe the picture-taking rollers of instant cameras.

2. Make sure your film is fresh. The expiration date is stamped on the box.

3. Check the batteries and battery contacts, a large cause of picture-taking failure. (Note: This is not necessary in Polaroid Sun SX-70, Pronto and One-Step cameras because a fresh


battery is contained in each film pack.)

4. If you think your camera isn't working properly, don't waste film or flash. Visit the Polaroid Camera Center, Main Street, U.S.A., for advice and/or the free loan of a Polaroid Sun Camera.

### When You Shoot

1. Stand so that the light falling on the subject comes from behind you, or from the side. With Polaroid Sun Cameras, you don't have to worry about where the sun is. Polaroid SX-70 type cameras also allow you to use flash in such situations.

*Take good scenes by keeping them clean and simple... include something in the foreground for interest and dimension.*



*Let action help make your pictures interesting. And remember to use flash when trying to stop action, or anytime the light is dim.*

2. When in doubt about the light, use flash,\* keeping in mind the maximum flash range of the camera. Polaroid Sun Cameras automatically blend flash with daylight to soften deep shadows and improve pictures made in the shade or against the light.


3. Don't attempt a picture closer than about 4', or a flash picture farther than about 12', except with 35mm and SX-70 cameras.

4. Try to fill the viewfinder with as much of the subject as possible. The larger the subject, the more interesting your picture will be!

5. Keep the background simple. Try to avoid distracting objects in the foreground and background objects that appear to "grow out" of the subject.

6. Hold the camera steady. Gently squeeze the shutter button; do not "punch" the button.

\*Flash photography is not permitted inside any indoor attraction at Disneyland, except "It's a Small World."



*Move in for good people pictures. Details and expressions will be sharper and clearer.*

## TIPS FOR BETTER DISNEYLAND MOVIES

1. Check the batteries in your camera. If you are going to film more than one cassette, it's good to have spare batteries with you.

2. You can create more interesting movies by thinking of a "theme" in advance—"A Tour Down Main Street, U.S.A." for example. With planning, you'll find the three-minute average cassette length just about right.

3. Shoot with the sun behind you or to your side. If you shoot

into the sun, you'll probably fool the camera's electric eye and the scene will end up too dark.

4. Try to have your entire scene lit evenly. Otherwise, very bright or dark areas may fool the electric eye and result in an over or under exposed scene.

5. Use the zoom lens sparingly and only when it contributes to a scene. Too much zooming in and out will be distracting to your viewers.

6. Move the camera sideways (panning) very slowly (about half as fast as you're inclined). If you pan too fast, your movie will appear blurred.

7. Shoot each scene for at least 5 seconds. Be sure to include

"establishing shots" (overall views, signs, etc.) as well as family action.
